Call for Director and Delegate Nominations

In 2023, the membership will elect three directors to the Ontario Bean Growers Board of Directors to a two-year term – one from each of the three districts.

A grower is eligible to vote and run for a director position on the Board of Directors if they grew dry edible beans of any market class in 2022 and/or 2023 and paid their annual license fees, or if they have a contract to grow beans in 2024. New growers who plan to grow beans in 2024 will be asked to complete an affidavit signed by their bean dealer as an indication of their commitment to grow beans in 2024 and pay board license fees. If the farm is not individually owned, only one person may represent that farm entity. This can be an employee, shareholder, director or partner in the business. In order to vote on behalf of a farm with multiple owners, the individual voting on behalf of the business must identify themselves as such on the online registration form.

A grower who produces beans in more than one district may vote and run for the position of director to the OBG Board of Directors in only one district. If a grower wishes to vote and/or be nominated to run for the position of director to the OBG Board of Directors, in a district other than the district in which they reside, that grower must make declaration to the OBG Board Office in written form on or before **January 16**, **2024**. Such a declaration will change the grower's district designation in the OBG database until such time as a different written declaration is received by the OBG Board Office. Otherwise, each grower will be assigned to the district in which they reside according to the current OBG database.

Nomination Process

Director Nominations

Nominations for District Directors must be made using the online nomination form available on OBG's website. All nominations must be submitted by the deadline of **4 pm EST on February 13, 2024.**

For those who have previously served as a director on the Ontario Bean Producers' Marketing Board and/or the Ontario Coloured Bean Growers Association, there is a maximum 15 combined years of service after which a grower is not eligible to run for a director position on the OBG board. Years of service as a delegate and/or committee man do not count in this aggregate.

District Delegate Nominations

In an effort to streamline the election process, we are strongly encouraging that nominations for District Delegates to be made in advance of the AGM. Nominations can be made using the online form available on the OBG website. There will also be a call for nominations from the floor. If any elections for the board of directors are held, unsuccessful candidates can choose to have their names added to the Delegate ballot for their district. There are six positions open for each of the three districts. District delegate elections will take place following the director elections.

University of Guelph Variety Licensing Agreement - Info for Growers

In 2020, the Ontario Bean Growers Board of Directors and the Office of Research at the University of Guelph (UofG) established a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) forming the Variety Commercialization Advisory Committee (VCAC). The purpose of the VCAC is to provide a forum for collaborative strategic discussion to enhance the commercialization process and maximize the economic impact of varieties developed by the Breeding Program.

A recent outcome of this MOU is the addition of a clause that will ensure access to UofG varieties to Ontario dry bean growers, regardless of which dealer they contract with. Any Ontario bean dealer licensing a UofG variety will be required to make every effort to meet the demand for seed for their own growers, as well as any other Ontario growers who wish to grow that variety. Recognizing, of course, that seed supply can be a challenge at times.

This clause applies only to UofG varieties licensed after August 2020.

Make sure you include dry beans in your 2024 crop plan!

There are currently 15 Ontario Bean Dealers remitting license fees to OBG - 12 of which have agreed to OBG promoting their company (see PDF at https://ontariobeans.on.ca/wp-content/uploads/2023/09/Dealers-list.pdf)
